

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Presentation

Supply chains are responsible for 80% of greenhouse gas emissions and 90% of the pollution of natural resources, within the world consumption sector. Along with this environmental damage, supply chains also suffer from high risks of human rights violations, such as slavery, loss of life or physical integrity due to precarious working conditions, or child labour. Such hazards had little visibility in the past, due to the limited scope of disclosure obligations. The expansion of reporting obligations encompass the whole value chain is likely to expose practices, stir controversy, and increase the risk of litigation, by both third parties and corporate plaintiffs.

The complex structures of supply chain in international trade face multiple legal challenges. The objective of this International Conference is to analyse each angle of every environmental and sustainability obligations for companies operating in global supply chains, including the contract, litigation, corporate and financial perspectives, and conduct a critical debate about the implications of the new regulatory trends in Europe and globally on due diligence across the value chain, in light also of experience of several industry sectors, particularly the financial sector.
